### Course Aims and Learning Outcomes

- This course is designed to give you a clear understanding of what the work of a professional musical theatre performer (both training and professional) actually entails and begin to develop the skills that form the foundation of a musical theatre performer's training.
- During this course you will be introduced to the basic principles of musical theatre training, which will be delivered through the following modules:
- Musical Theatre Skills 1; will introduce you to technical and creative musical theatre skills, with understanding of technical skills explicit and implicit in the practice of dance, singing and acting.
- Musical Theatre Skills 2; will allow you to begin to embody and demonstrate previously understood technical and creative musical theatre skills, with comprehension of the expression and development of individual technical skills in the practice of dance, singing and acting.
- Introduction to Audition Technique; to introduce understanding of the professional etiquette essential to auditions, the vocational and performance skills relevant to an audition context, and the core professional behaviours and expectations for this scenario.
- Audition Practice: to allow you to develop and openly discuss your acquired understanding of professional standard etiquette essential for auditions, and the core professional behaviours and expectations for this scenario, and further develop vocational and performance skills specific to an audition context, Additional work on interview and audition preparation with mock auditions.
- Rehearsal & Performance; to create open and responsive performers and introduce you to the process of a professional rehearsal and performance.
- Contextual Studies; classes and workshops that investigating and exploring 'the musical theatre performer', performance elements, and collaborative practice.



Our basic approach to musical theatre training is rooted in the principles of Stanislavski, as developed by Uta Hagen for Acting, Estill model for Singing, and American Musical Theatre Jazz in Dance. However, neither the Italia Conti 'CertHE in Musical Theatre Performance' nor 'BA (Hons) Musical Theatre' courses seek to mould young performers to any one method or system within their training. Rather, they try to make available to you, as a student, a range of ideas and training methods, so that you may begin to construct a personal way of working, which you can continue to develop at other musical theatre training institutions, drama schools or in other learning environments.

On completing the 'CertHE in Musical Theatre Performance' you will have knowledge of the skills necessary to develop as a musical theatre performer and should have some capacity to apply them. You should also have a solid sense of their own potential as a performer.

The overall aims of the course are:

- To give you an introduction to conservatoire-style vocational training, including a greater understanding of what is required of a musical theatre performer and musical theatre performer in training, as well as a solid understanding of what the industry requires from the contemporary performer, thereby enabling you to make a truly informed decision about pursuing musical theatre, other creative strands within the arts and wider theatre practice with an idea of the approaches/options available and best suited to the individual in pursuing these goals.
- To develop your understanding, practical engagement and implementation of necessary musical theatre and performance training skills. To create an intellectual and practical foundation in musical theatre work, vocal work and physical work as well as developing critical and analytical awareness preparing you for a three-year conservatoire-style training or practical university course.
- To prepare you for vocational practical auditions and wider HE studies. Focussing on the basic requirements of singing, acting and dance, and interview preparation. Building confidence, ease and an appropriate approach to and communication of the three core disciplines, which form the basis of a successful candidate on a three-year conservatoire-style training course.
- To offer you tasters in specialist skills and other creative career and training options that can both inform your understanding of the musical theatre and theatre making collaboration and potentially ignite an interest in a non-acting career within the industry and offer support and advice in pursuing this.

- Demonstrate critical awareness of research methodologies and approaches as specific to musical theatre performers and creative work generation, as well as relevant academic approaches (DP, EID, CID, COI)
- Identify and use a coherent process to develop and explore a role. (EID, COI)
- Understand and use some of the language employed in a musical theatre setting. (SID, CID)

### Thinking skills

- Analyse and evaluate all disciplines to identify stylistic and technical detail. (COI)
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- Identify research methodologies and approaches to sourcing appropriate audition materials. (COI, EID, CID)
- Explore and identify appropriate courses that would suit your desired career path. (EID, PID, CID, CC, COI)
- Recognise appropriate and suitable audition material choices for you as an individual. (EID, SID, PID, CID,)
- Analyse your individual cognitive response to an audition process. (COI)
- Reflect on own performance in class and assessment. (EID, SID, CID
- Identify personal strengths and needs, and reflect objectively on personal development as a musical theatre performer (EID, PID, COI)



- Operate and think reflexively, creatively/imaginatively and critically to develop ideas and construct arguments within the generation of presentations and other written tasks (DP, EID, CID, SID, COI)

### Learning and Teaching

There will be a variety of types of sessions; primarily practical work where students will be doing exercises in a group studio workshop, but also talks and individual tutorials. There will also be reflective and critical sessions which are designed to assist students with preparing for the next steps of their training, preparing them for auditions, interviews and developing their personal statement.

Knowledge is developed through

- Guided reading
- Knowledge-based activities with feedback
- Classes, workshops, lectures and skills-based activities with feedback
- 1:1 and small group tutorials

Thinking skills are developed through

- Classes, workshops, lectures and skills-based activities with feedback (script analysis etc.)
- Reflective activities with feedback

Practical skills are developed through

- Classes, workshops, lectures and skills-based activities with feedback
- 1:1 and small group tutorials
- Rehearsals and performances with feedback

Skills for life and work (general skills) are developed through

- The demands of the study medium (i.e high contact-hours, rehearsal process/periods, etc.)
- Class work
- Project work



Each student will also receive a detailed briefing sheet or scheme of work at the beginning of each term, which will outline the specific content of each class series within each module, and the learning outcomes and assessment practice within each of these.

In general, students will be assessed on Learning Outcomes (as per the Module Specifications) pertaining to 'Knowledge', 'Thinking Skills', 'Practical Skills' and 'Skills for Life and Work', via the following methods:

- Cumulative Practice (Rehearsal process/class work)
- Sharings/performance
- Presentation
- Essays
- Written reflective analysis and evaluations
- Reflective Portfolio

Students with disabilities and/or particular learning needs should discuss assessments with the Course Leader and/or Head of Year to ensure they are able to fully engage with all assessment within the course.

### Work or Study Placements

There is no compulsory and/or optional work/study placement within this course.

### Course Structure

All courses are credit-rated to help you to understand the amount and level of study that is needed.

One credit is equal to 10 hours of directed study time (this includes everything you do e.g. lecture, seminar and private study).

Credits are assigned to one of 5 levels:

- 3 Equivalent in standard to GCE 'A' level and is intended to prepare students for year one of an undergraduate degree course.
- 4 Equivalent in standard to the first year of a full-time undergraduate degree course.
- 5 Equivalent in standard to the second year of a full-time undergraduate degree course.
- 6 Equivalent in standard to the third year of a full-time undergraduate degree course.
- 7 Equivalent in standard to a Masters degree.

Courses are made up of modules that are each credit weighted.

All modules are core modules, which a student must have passed (i.e. been awarded credit) in order to achieve the Cert HE award. There are no optional modules for this course.

Please note that this course includes workshops and classes which deliver complimentary skills. These classes may be compulsory sessions but are not assessed within the course, and may vary from year to year.

The overall credit-rating of this course is **120 credits**. If for some reason you are unable to achieve this credit you may be entitled to an intermediate award, the level of the award will depend on the amount of credit you have accumulated. ### **Course Specific Regulations**

As a student on this course, you are expected to maintain a 90% attendance rate in order to progress effectively through the course and achieve the learning outcomes. Attendance is compulsory on an intensive timetable which runs for a MINIMUM of 30 contact hours per week over at least 36 weeks and typically more, with additional self-led study hours. Attendance of less than 90% may be considered a disciplinary matter and may after due process lead to termination of studies on the course.

The course runs according to specific academic regulations and policies which may diverge from standard UEL frameworks in order to uphold the professional vocational standards expected and to ensure the principles of holism, integrated skills development and embodied learning are fully supported.

Typical Duration



The expected duration of this course is **1 year full-time**.

The time limit for completion of a course is two years after first enrolment on the course.
